1848 Washington Printing Press Restored




Back in the days when our Journalism School required "press time" as part of its program, students used this beautiful 1848 Washington hand press under the supervision of C. Harold Lauck. No longer a school requirement by the end of the 1960s, the press was taken apart and later

moved to the library. It took the enthusiasm of David Clinger '55 to put the press back in working order. Currently an amateur printer in Richmond, Clinger learned the art of printing on this very press, and hoped to see it restored by his 50th reunion. A grant from Clinger and fellow Journalism graduate Lewis Cope '55, together with Clinger's own physical work on the press, made this wish come true. \$2400; that money will be used to purchase library materials that are not in the current budget." Browsers walked out with some great bargains in books...a bibliophiles dream!




Donations for next year's Parents' Weekend book sale are accepted all year long at Leyburn.
