
The CALYX Board extends its greeting to the University and its friends by compiling a record of events in all college activities for the session 1909-10.

Our warm appreciation goes out to those who have aided us in making this volume a lasting memorial of the session 1909-10.

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


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Dr. George Hutcheson Denny

BY FORMER GOVERNOR WM. A. MACCORKLE (*Class of 1878*)

PRESIDENT GEORGE HUTCHESON DENNY was born in Hanover County, Virginia, December 3, 1870. He is the son of Rev. George H. and Charlotte M. (Wright) Denny. He was graduated at Hampden-Sidney College, in 1891, with the first honor of his class. He received the degree of Master of Arts from the same institution in 1892, and the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Virginia in 1896. He has also received the degree (honorary) of LL. D. from the Furman University, South Carolina, and from Washington College, Maryland. He was married to Janie Junkin Strickler in Richmond, Va., June 1, 1899. He was master at Pantops Academy (1892-1896), professor of Latin at Hampden-Sidney (1896-1899), and at Washington and Lee University (1899-1901). He was elected president of this University in June, 1901. In 1904, he was president of the Southern Association of Colleges and Preparatory Schools. Since 1906, he has been trustee of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching; and since 1908, Chairman of the Board of Charities and Correction for the State of Virginia.

Such, in brief outline, is a synopsis of the life of the distinguished man to whom this college annual is dedicated. It would seem, at first blush, that the dedicatory statement, such as this is intended to be, should be written by one of his immediate co-workers; but, upon reflection, it is possibly best that the results of his ten years' work as president of Washington and Lee should be written, however briefly, by an alumnus.

Providence has been very kind to the South in giving her the men who could work out for her the most complicated problems that have ever confronted a section or a people. When we have summoned leaders to fight our battles, they have appeared. When we have needed builders to renew the waste places, they have not been wanting.

Equal in importance with the material and political life of the South, has been the need of constructive genius in our educational life. During the





period of President Denny's administration, and for ten years preceding, there was occurring an epoch in the educational life of this country. This period of change was peculiarly vital to the South. The country was widening and broadening its policy, changing its life—whether for better or worse, I will not here discuss. Education, business, political life, economic thought, have been going with the new impulse of the day. To meet the conditions arising from this era of change was a supremely important demand. There was a supreme need of strong men at the head of our institutions of learning, men fully able to separate the good from the great measure of the new, yet at the same time to examine, with discrimination, the changing conditions of the times, and to hold, with unerring judgment, to the old and fine traditions of learning and the high moral values which through the years have glorified the South.

At the time of the election of President Denny, then a very young man, I am frank to say that I, in common with many others, regarded the matter with apprehension, for it was a critical period for Southern education, and an especially critical period for Washington and Lee.

With splendid skill and infinite patience he bound together the widely diverse elements in the life of the college. His strong grasp of the situation was the admiration of his friends and the despair of those who were prepared to adversely criticize. Those who believed in the old order of things, who were filled with a conservatism that almost failed to understand the changing need of the hour, were with consummate tact led into the light of a newer and brighter day—while the heedless haste of him who would hurry into untried ways was restrained until the road was clear and safe. The steady hand and splendid personality of President Denny wrought both conservative and liberal into one cohesive force, working with one end in view—the advancement of the college along high and catholic and sane lines.

In a varied and extended experience with many things and many men, I have seen no greater evidence of consummate ability, tact, patience, and kindness than was thus shown in consolidating the different elements which then composed the friends, the alumni, and the clientele of the college.

President Denny's splendid leap to the very front rank of American educational executives; the high consideration in which he is held by many





great thinkers of the day; the curriculum of the college wisely extended to meet the condition of the changing times; the active life and increased ability for its great work, under the President's progressive leadership, impel me to express, on behalf of the alumni and friends of the University, cordial approval of his policy and the gratitude of those who have her real welfare at heart. There has been no reactionary life in his administration. There has been no unwise straining after the new things of the day. Under his leadership the University has grasped and appropriated the good of the new, discarded that which does not fit the times, and held wisely to the great fundamentals which have always been a characteristic of this seat of learning. I frankly say that the friends of the University largely ascribe her commanding position at this time to the peculiar constructive ability of her president, which is as rare as it is invaluable.

Again, from another viewpoint, this era of widening ideas was of great importance to Washington and Lee. Education is intensely practical. No thoughtful man who contemplates the work of a great educational institution understands that its success has been founded merely upon the learning disseminated within its walls. This learning is fundamental and necessary, and without it an institution cannot attain its true ends. But the inner history of every great educational institution shows that business sagacity and financial acumen are just as important to its ultimate success as is the learning of the books. With this change of conditions to which I have referred, and with the institutions in the North daily adding to their already large endowments, there was the natural fear that Washington and Lee might not be able to keep pace in the race. It is a matter of pride that President Denny, appreciating these conditions, possessed the ability and energy and foresight which have enabled Washington and Lee to increase, beyond all precedent, her ability to effectually carry on her work.

If you doubt, look around you: The campus resounding with the tread of six hundred students, where there were formerly about two hundred; the endowment increased by three hundred thousand dollars; new schools; new departments; new walkways; old buildings renovated; new buildings and new equipment amounting to more than one hundred and fifty thousand dollars; a debt of thirty thousand dollars paid; the annual income, the very





life-blood of the institution, increased from fifty to practically one hundred thousand dollars; the admission requirements raised from five to fourteen Carnegie units. Can any one say, in the face of these splendid achievements, that the president should not have the gratitude, the co-operation, and the high regard of every man who loves and reveres Washington and Lee?

It is equally certain that these results are only a foretaste of what will be accomplished by him when his common sense, his knowledge of people, his constructive ability, his high character, have wider reach and effect, as his experience in affairs, and his acquaintanceship with men, ripen and expand. Speaking as a man of affairs, and not as a student or scholar, conversant with the opinion of men who are doing things and who understand the situation of the day, I have no hesitancy in saying that President Denny's ten years of administration have been consecrated in their purpose, splendid in their results, and unselfishly untiring towards the perpetuation of the high life of Washington and Lee, and the widening and deepening of her power for good. And, in my judgment, as the years grow apace, his ability for achieving great things will become still further recognized, and his name will take a high place in the catalogue of those who have wrought mightily for Virginia and the nation.

But when we were defeated by those "Freshies" 40 to 12 in the annual Sophomore-Freshman Ball Rush, we were compelled to acknowledge for once that the table had been turned—and we were under the table.

The crowning event of the year, however, was the Sophomore Cotillion of November 29th. On this occasion the 1912 men exhibited that same hospitality which they have always shown, and the affair was acknowledged to be one of the most successful ever given by any class.

As to honors in athletics, the Class of 1912 won them by the score. They were awarded monograms in every branch of sport: baseball, football,





basket-ball, and track. In fact, so large a majority of the ball team last spring was composed of Freshmen that it was spoken of by the papers as "W. & L.'s Freshman Team."

Such is our past. From it the reader may judge with what bright prospects the Class of 1912 looks forward to graduation, and the future.

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HISTORY OF FRESHMAN CLASS

The history of 1913 as a people cannot really be said to have begun until after the great struggle on Wilson Field, when they fought for their very existence with the hostile tribe known as Sophomores. We will consider briefly, however, the preceding periods.

There is considerable evidence that in early times there was a general movement of tribes from the South and West to the Rockbridge Country. During this early or patriarchial period there was practically no unity among them, but each man was the head of his family of one. Gradually, the need of greater strength against the Sophomores, the earlier inhabitants of the country, drew these individual patriarchs together into tribes under certain natural leaders, the most prominent of whom was named Hook.

There are numerous legends which would lead us to believe that there were several encounters between the stronger of these tribes and the native inhabitants, in which, for the most part, the invaders were worsted. While these skirmishes were of little importance in themselves, yet they made the people of 1913 realize their need for greater strength, and provided a common cause which finally drew them together as a united people.

The opposing interests of the two peoples finally came to a head in the great combat before mentioned, which took place on Wilson Field. From the time of this battle, October 1, 1909, the history of the nation is well defined. The battle was an important one in history, for upon it depended the future of these two great nations. Hook, the leading sheik of the invaders, ranged his forces on the east side of the great plain and Le Bus, the opposing leader established his camp toward the west. When the opposing forces met the struggle for supremacy was intense, but it soon became evident that the invaders were the more powerful. So excellent was the generalship of Hook, and so valiantly was he supported, that the defeat of the Sophomores was decisive. (From this battle we get the expression, "Get the Hook.") It has been estimated that the victory for the invaders was in the ratio of 40 to 12.

From this time the new people (sometimes spoken of as Freshmen) made rapid strides both in civilization and government. They are unique in that they completely skipped the monarchical period and immediately formed a pure democracy. Soon after the battle of Wilson Field a great assembly was held at which the new government was organized and officers chosen, for the most part from men prominent in the great struggle. From that day to this the nation has steadily developed, so that there is every indication that in time their influence and power will be beyond all others.

GYMNASIUM

A few years ago the most colossal movement in the career of Washington and Lee was started in the form of raising a million-dollar endowment. The movement had its inception on the occasion of the centennial of the birth of General Robert Edward Lee, the South's warrior and president of Washington and Lee University. For a time the progress of the movement had been interfered with by the recent panic. When the clouds of financial depression had been blown away by the winds of returning prosperity, the movement took on new life. Under this movement a gymnasium was provided for so that the physical side of college life should receive proper attention. Because of the deplorable character and inadequacy of the gymnasium the board has seen fit to concentrate its energies on the acquisition of a building for physical culture, so that the present unfortunate conditions can be remedied and that the whole field of physical development will receive its proper attention. As to the degree of progress reached in this step, the following letters will show:

LEXINGTON, Va., November 5, 1909.

MR. HERBERT WELSH,
Philadelphia, Pa.

My Dear Mr. Welsh:

I am glad to have your letter of November 3d in which you express yourself as willing to accept my request to take official charge of the effort to raise \$37,500 for the new college gymnasium.

We recall, with appreciation, your official connection with, and your most valuable service in, the raising of the \$100,000 endowment for the chair of Economics and Political Science, as a memorial to the late President William L. Wilson. In fact, this movement was merged into a movement already inaugurated by you for the further endowment of Washington and Lee. Your associates in this work, including Mr. Cleveland, Mr. George Foster Peabody, Mr. Isidor Straus, Mr. James C. Carter, Mr. John G. Carlisle, Mr. Oswald G. Villard, Mr. Horace White and others, fully recognized and appreciated the value of your services as treasurer of the Wilson Memorial movement, and as an active and valuable factor in bringing that movement to a successful issue.

I am persuaded that you will be equally successful in this movement. It is a movement that must appeal to that class of people who desire to give their money where it is most urgently needed and will do the largest amount of good. We are not asking a college endowment. We are appealing merely for modest facilities to guarantee the physical well-being of the large group of young men entrusted to our care. We are voicing the appeal of these young men who deserve to have a reasonable opportunity to develop their physical strength and to conserve their physical vigor.

Perhaps I should add that the present gymnasium, which is a small, wooden structure, was erected a quarter of a century ago merely as a temporary makeshift; that the student body has grown from 200 to 600 in that time; that it is now totally inadequate to our





needs; that it is altogether unworthy of a modern college; and that a large proportion of our large student body cannot hope to have any gymnasium facilities at all until a new building is erected.

Many institutions, with only one-third of our matriculation, are providing gymnasium buildings costing \$100,000. We propose to erect a modest structure, costing \$50,000. A gentleman has agreed to contribute \$12,500 whenever we raise from other sources \$37,500. We are most grateful that you will consent to take charge of the movement to raise the \$37,500 needed to secure the \$50,000.

DEAR SIR:

At the request of President Denny, of Washington and Lee University, I am trying to raise \$50,000 toward the erection of a gymnasium building for that institution. The need for this is pressing, and its details are cogently stated in the accompanying letter from President Denny.

He has also, at my request, written an explanation of why I have been asked to take part in the present effort to secure a gymnasium for Washington and Lee.

Our effort has begun most hopefully. One gentleman has promised \$12,500 for the gymnasium, conditioned on the raising of the remaining \$37,500.

My interest in the Educational Work of Washington and Lee is based, not only on my close personal knowledge of the fine intellectual and moral work it does for the young men who are its students, but on my deep conviction that it is destined to exert a strong and ever-increasing influence toward the right solution of the race problems of the South. My full reasons for holding this opinion cannot be set forth within the brief space of a personal letter. They can only be hinted at in a word: The spirit of justice, hope, and of a sound mind, which is predominantly the prevailing one of Washington and Lee—of its President, Faculty, and Trustees—is that which must rule and bless the South of the future. Aid to this University means, I believe, the extension of this spirit, and its ultimate triumph throughout the South.

The Y. M. C. A.

A RÉSUMÉ OF ITS WORK DURING THE YEAR JUST PAST

THE Young Men's Christian Association is the organized religious work of the University. The Christian young man is not content to let his Christianity sleep while he is in college, nor does he aim to propagate it alone. As the name of the organization implies, the Christian men unite their efforts in the Association work for their own building of character, and for the uplifting of their fellow-students.

The Association stands for cleanness in athletics, thoroughness in the classroom, and purity of life. It encourages all legitimate college activities, and especially urges the growing young man to train and develop his spiritual faculties. Strong character is the foundation of success and happiness. Character is the result of habits, and habits of life are usually formed on the college campus. The Association aims to bring these habits into harmony with Christian principles, and thus to equip for the world men of right living, and of unselfish, loving services for others.

An organization with such a lofty purpose could not fail to command the respect of every open-minded earnest student, and the same is true at Washington and Lee. The student body as a whole loyally support the work, which has been steadily widening in influence since the birth of the Association here forty-five years ago in the group prayer meeting organized by General Robert E. Lee.

The Association has been an important factor in the campus life at Washington and Lee ever since that early date. All classes of college men are brought under its influence, and work together for the uplifting of the student body. Some of the most prominent men in the University are found among the leaders in the Association work. It stands for the best in the lives of men and thus it commands the services of the best of students. It works for the betterment of every matriculated student, and hence the most loyal Washington and Lee men have its interests deeply at heart.





The activities of the Association are numerous and far reaching. Weekly religious meetings are held on Tuesday night. They are addressed by students, members of the faculty, ministers of the town, or by strong speakers invited from a distance. While the attendance has not been what it should be owing to the scattered condition of the students, yet great interest is manifested, and the help is sure.

Another interesting weekly meeting is held in the Castle Hill Dormitory, which reaches a number of students under their own roof. Other group prayer circles and committee meetings are held when necessary, all of which tend to deepen the religious interest of those who participate.

A series of special evangelistic meetings was conducted by Dr. James L. Vance during the last week of January. The attendance at these meetings was excellent. Great interest was manifested in the heart-searching appeals of the powerful speaker, and a number of men took a definite stand for the Christian life. Following the meetings, the Association aims to bring those interested into the churches. Consequently a number of students unite with the churches of the town every year.

Another means of bringing the student in touch with the churches, and of keeping them interested in their church work, is through Bible Study. The Bible classes meet in connection with the Sunday schools of the town, being led by experienced men. The attendance this year has been a decided improvement over that of previous years.

In Mission Study during the fall term, Washington and Lee not only made a record for herself, but for the colleges of North America in the number of classes organized. In fact, according to the New York statistics, there were more Mission Study classes at Washington and Lee than in all of the institutions of North America at the same time of the year sixteen years ago. The classes meet in the different boarding houses immediately after dinner or supper on Sunday, and the attendance in some instances has been remarkable, because the men will not fail to come together at meal time. The total enrollment was 301. Great interest in missions has resulted. Washington and Lee was represented at the Rochester Student Volunteer Convention by five delegates.





The membership of the Association is very large, though far from what it should be. It welcomes every student into its membership who is willing to show his interest. Many are anxious to do so.

A series of Life Work addresses are held during the winter, when such callings as the ministry, foreign field, home missions, Y. M. C. A. secretaryship, etc., are presented. Many men are thus brought face to face with the very greatest opportunities of a life investment. The Ministerial Band now numbers eighteen, and the Volunteer Band six. They both meet weekly for the development of their members, and as recruiting agencies.

An interesting reception was given to the new men at the beginning of the year to welcome them within the college portals. Music, college yells, speeches, and refreshments all contributed to a jolly evening. The members of the Y. M. C. A. take pleasure at the beginning of each year in helping the new men to become comfortably located, and accustomed to their new surroundings.

In fact from the beginning to the end of the college year the Y. M. C. A. seeks to help every man in any way that it possibly can, so as to make him best fitted for life and usefulness. It employs a general secretary for his full time to supervise its various activities. The opportunities are limitless, and the work only begun.



A RÉSUMÉ OF THE SEASON 1909-10

FOOTBALL in this section last year was fraught with many difficulties, and henceforth it would seem that its future progress is to be attended by unusual opposition on the part of the public. Notwithstanding this fact we confidently hope that nothing will be done to destroy the great game whose faults we admit, but whose merits, we assert, outweigh them. All agree that a modification of the rules is perhaps demanded, and this should be the sensible ground instead of a complete elimination. Whatever change is adopted it will in all probability be a radical one, so that the season of 1909 may well be regarded as the last under the old *régime*.

With Washington and Lee expectations were high, which unfortunately were but poorly realized as the season advanced. Coach Pfeiffer, lately of Princeton, found a large and willing squad when he arrived in Lexington, and throughout the season his best efforts were directed toward whipping that bunch of material into a football machine. In this he was ably assisted by Coach Shaughnessy, and it was due to no lack of work on their part that our success was not greater.

The opening game was played as usual with Roanoke College on one of the warmest days of the fall. The score of 18 to 0 indicated little, but the work of the team showed considerable promise. Following this Hampden-Sidney was defeated 6 to 0. The team gained ground at will, but seemed to lack scoring ability. Much better form, however, was manifested the next week in the game with Wake Forest, and, this improvement continuing, Davidson proved an easy victory.

Here, however, the good work ceased, and was extremely conspicuous by its absence in the game with V. P. I., which possessed not a single good point. The only redeeming feature was the rally which succeeded, and the following Saturday Washington and Lee played her only good game of the year, losing to A. & M. by the close score of 3 to 0, which should have been a tie.





Only one more game remained to be played, and in this encounter with North Carolina, Washington and Lee lost the first of the series which has been played in the last three years. It seems hard to account for the string of defeats, and though there were extenuating circumstances the work of the team as a whole was poor. It was unfortunate that the schedule could not be completed, for there was a chance to redeem as last year, but owing to the distressing accident which occurred this was denied.

Gazed upon as a whole the result was not flattering, but a few things should be mentioned. This was the initial year under a new system, and naturally was attended by unusual difficulties at first. What contributed, however, more than anything else was the unusual number of injuries attendant upon the men, and at no two times was the same team in anything like fit condition. Changes were continual, and really organized work impossible.

Two noteworthy changes occurred this year which were productive of much good, and which we hope to see continued. One was the advent of the training table, which supplied a long-felt want, and the other was the new accommodations afforded the team under the library. These added much to the comfort of the team and served materially to lessen the unfortunate conditions with which the men have had to combat. There is one thing still to suggest, and this article closes with the hope which, if fulfilled, would do more than anything else toward relieving us of the many slight injuries which throughout each fall keep the men disabled. This is, that some step be taken to place a sod upon Wilson Field. In its present state, a granolithic walk is little harder, and as long as it remains in its present condition we cannot expect to have anything like an organized team which can keep together.

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

A RÉSUMÉ OF THE SEASON 1909

THE fall of 1909 found a good nucleus of last year's team, and immediately preparations were started for the annual cross-country run. It was thought advisable to change the course as the going on the old Buena Vista Road was too rough for safety. The race was, therefore, moved to the New York-Atlanta Automobile Highway, including a five-mile stretch of good country with a "grandstand" finish on Main Street opposite the postoffice. George Anderton won this in the good time 30 minutes 35 seconds, with Breidenbach second, and C. Glass, Jr., third.

The spring schedule of 1909 came to a close in the latter part of May. Although it ended in a defeat the season had been all in all a success. Several records had been broken, namely, the hammer throw, the hundred-yard dash, and the high hurdles, and a hard-fought victory had been won from North Carolina.

For the first time in the history of the track at Washington and Lee University we had a winter season. The management took a relay team composed of Anderton, Glass, Luker and Stone to Richmond to enter in the annual Southern intercollegiate meet. Although we lost the relay race to Maryland Agricultural College by a close margin, our men entered other events, netting them eight points, thus giving them second place in the meet, with Virginia first. This was a creditable showing considering the fact that there were thirty collegiate, athletic club and regimental teams in the meet. Anderton and Robbins being the point winners, the former winning the half mile and the latter getting second in the pole vault.

The first annual interclass track meet was held at the skating rink February the seventeenth, and was a decided success. The Freshmen won the meet with a score of thirty-four points, with the Juniors a close second with thirty points. In all the different events the records were good, and point to a strong winning team in the spring. The spring schedule will contain two more dual meets, making four in all.

Virginia was the next to suffer defeat at Washington and Lee's hands, but the following week during the usual mid-season lull Washington and Lee lost to V. P. I. in Lexington. A week later, at Blacksburg, V. P. I. was again victorious in a close and furiously fast game.

The work of the team on its Northern trip was far better than would first appear from the record of games won and lost, for the Washington and Lee men played the strong Central Y. M. C. A. team of Baltimore to a standstill; and although the team was greatly handicapped by awkward and illegal goals the St. John's and Mt. St. Mary's games were decided by the narrow margin of one and two points, respectively.

The trip brought out the best passing and general team work thus far exhibited by a Washington and Lee team, and the season's record is one in which the team and University may justly take pride.

Boat Club

A RÉSUMÉ OF LAST SEASON'S WORK

WASHINGTON AND LEE is uniquely fortunate among the educational institutions of the South in possessing a branch of athletics which is a leading one at the great universities of this country, and one which is a splendid aid to the physical development of those entering into its activities.

Beginning in the year 1874, there have been annual races between the two rival boat clubs in the University—the Harry Lee and the Albert Sidney. It is a matter of regret that conditions prevent the placing of this sport on an intercollegiate basis, but the enthusiasm and interest displayed at finals in the exciting finishes between the Blue and Red crews warrants beyond a doubt the permanency of such contests, even though meetings with other colleges cannot possibly be arranged.

Remarkable development has been made in the progress of the sport itself. No professional coaches have ever been engaged, the old men on one year's crew unselfishly devoting a great deal of time to the training of the new material the following year, and the perfecting of another fighting machine. Not so many years ago it took seven minutes for the struggling crews to traverse the race course on North River—now the time is a little over four. The clumsy, six-oared cutters have long since been supplanted by the best type of modern racing shells.

In view of the healthy manliness of the sport itself, and the never-flagging interest of the student body in its progress, there is no reason why this development should not be as great in the future as in the past.

The standing in victories for the two boat clubs is as follows: Harry Lee, 18; Albert Sidney, 16. The Harry Lee crew won the 1909 race by a quarter of a boat length.


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Afterword

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
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
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
