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



















hen the sun peeks over the Blue Ridge

Lee Chapel across the Front Lawn, the campus of


Washington and Lee University comes alive.

develop personal relationships, and it is not uncommon








for a professor to invite students for dinner.

Subtle traditions are evident as well, such as frisbee games on the Front Lawn, or trips to Goshen, giving way




in the winter to snowball fights in the quad, taking advantage of Lexington's one or two






the library on exam weeks becomes the nightly center of activity, as students cram for one last push before breaks.


As the day draws to a close and the campus gradually returns to sleep, leav-



with speaker G. Gorden Liddy, a former Nixon administration official. In the Nixon administration, Liddy served first as special assistant to the Secretary of the Treasury and in 1971 began his tenure as staff assistant to the President.

Today, Liddy hosts a D.C. radio program and is the author of three bestsellers.

Keeping in step with our nation's political concerns, W&L hosted Oliver North, who spoke on "The Courage to Lead," which emphasized problems in America such as the growing deficit and declining morality. North voiced his concern that the American public has not put the best leadership in office. He stressed that each American can help these problems by contribut-

ing to the community.

One year after the Los Angeles riots, the controversy was still hot enough to pack Lee Chapel for a debate between former Los Angeles Police Chief Daryl Gates and American Civil Liberties Union President Nadine Strossen.

Gates and Strossen debated the issue of police brutality under the topic of "Law and Order and the L.A. Riots."

All in all, Washington and Lee hosted a great number of prominent and informative speakers who shared their ideas and beliefs with the W&L community.

Shortly after noon on Feb. 26, 1993, an explosion rocked the World Trade Center in New York, leaving several dead and hundreds injured. Believed to have been an act of Islamic Fundamentalists, the bomb was carried in a rented yellow Ford van which was parked in the garage below the twin towers. This was the first terrorist act committed on U.S. soil.

Across the Atlantic, in both Eastern and Western Europe, enormous changes have taken place. One of those is the breakup of Yugoslavia. The territory of Yugoslavia for centuries was a battle-ground between the Austro-Hungarian and Ottoman empires.

In 1918, the Kingdom of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes was declared, and in 1929 it was renamed Yugoslavia. The new country was torn by demands for autonomy by Croatians who opposed Serbian domination.

The war left thousands dead, sent more than a million fleeing, and led to the creation of dreaded detention camps, likened to those of Nazi Germany.

Human suffering around the world has been most exemplified in the African country of Somalia.

Three months after the world woke up to one of the worst famines in history, food started to reach hundreds of thousands of Somalis.

Estimates of the dead range from 100,000 to half a million, but no one knows just how many have perished in the Horn of Africa nation.

More than a million Somalis fled their homeland for refugee camps in neighboring countries, with the wealthier ones seeking safe haven in Europe, the United States, Canada and elsewhere.

Central Somalia is where the international community has concentrated its relief efforts. Nations have arranged airlifts to relieve the towns

lence and prevent looting of relief shipments.

The troops patrolled the meanest streets Mogadishu with a soft touch.

Children waved as they passed or ran to shake hands with those who had come to help.

Their goal was to provide safe passage for food delivery to starying Somalis.

Closer to home, the country focused on the devastating forces mother nature brought to bear.

Hurricane Andrew struck southern Florida on Aug. 24, 1992, with winds gusting to 164 mph and a 12-foot tidal surge that flattened many homes, uprooted trees, flung boats into the streets and wrecked an Air Force base.

The hurricane continued on, carving its way through the plantation country of Louisiana, throwing tornadoes like darts at a 100-mile-wide target and pumping torrents of rain at stormweary Louisianans.

Fifty-five deaths were directly or indirectly linked to the hurricane -41 in Florida, 10 in Louisiana and four in the Bahamas.

The hurricane's 54hour rampage, the most

expensive natural disaster ever in the country. caused an estimated \$20 billion damage in Florida, \$1.5 billion in Louisiana and \$250 million in the Bahamas.

In the world of sports, the globe's eyes turned to the 1992 Summer Olympics. An era of amateurism passed into an age of professionalism, and the Olympics were transformed forever, when professional athletes were allowed to compete in the 1992 Summer Olympics in Barcelona, Spain.

Countering the attacks of commercialism, coach Chuck Daly argued that the presence of pros could do nothing but enhance cade Olympic funk, finishing only four behind in the closest medals race since America won in 1964 in Tokyo. Now it stands poised to rule the sports world in Atlanta in 1996 after arguably its greatest Summer Games.

Why Not?




own doctrines.

Sophomore running back Michael MacLane was the big star in the Davidson and Hampden-Sydney games. MacLane ran for 152 yards and a touchdown against Davidson. He added three receptions for 59 yards and another touchdown for good measure. The following week he ran for 87 yards and three touchdowns against Hampden-Sydney, but suffered an injury that forced him out for the rest of the season.

W&L held Guilford to 106 yards of total offense, including negative three yards rushing, while forcing four turnovers.





W&L entered the final week ranked 10th in Division III and needing a win over archrival Roanoke to return to the NCAA Division III tournament. The bad weather early in the season had forced the postponement of the Roanoke game to the final week and the stage was set for a thriller. Roanoke came to Wilson Field ranked third in the country and coming off a 40-goal outburst against Va. Wesleyan. The Generals pulled off the upset 9-8 to the delight of a large W&L gathering. Senior John Hunter scored three first-quarter goals to stake W&L to a lead it would never relinquish and senior Brian Murtagh was unflappable in goal, making 18 saves.

our ever-changing world. Such a combination of pride and tradition is


