# Top Stories 

## Around the World

Shortly after noon on Feb. 26, 1993, an explosion rocked the World Trade Center in New York. leaving several dead and hundreds injured. Believed to have been an act of Islamic Fundamentalists, the bomb was carried in a rented yellow Ford van which was parked in the garage below the twin towers. This was the first terrorist act committed on U.S. soil.
Across the Atlantic, in both Eastern and Western Europe, enormous changes have taken place. One of those is the breakup of Yugoslavia. The territory of Yugoslavia for centuries was a battleground between the Austro-Hungarian and Ottoman empires.
In 1918, the Kingdom of the Serbs. Croats and Slovenes was declared. and in 1929 it was renamed Yugoslavia. The new country was torn by demands for autonomy by Croatians who opposed Serbian domination.
President Tito, who

ruled from 1945 until his death in 1980, kept a tight lid on internal ethnic rivalries, but since his death, central power has been eaten away by the feuding republics.

The war left thousands dead, sent more than a million fleeing, and led to the creation of dreaded detention camps, likened to those of Nazi Germany.

Human suffering around the world has been most exemplified in the African country of Somalia.

Three months after the world woke up to one of the worst famines in history, food started to reach hundreds of thousands of Somalis.

Estimates of the dead range from 100,000 to half a million, but no one knows just how many have perished in the Horn of Africa nation.

More than a million Somalis fled their homeland for refugee camps in neighboring countries. with the wealthier ones seeking safe haven in Europe, the United States. Canada and elsewhere.

Central Somalia is where the international community has concentrated its relief efforts. Nations have arranged airlifts to relieve the towns

U.S. Marines arrived in Somalia on Dec. 9. 1992. to assist in curtailing the wanton. widespread vio-

lence and prevent looting of relief shipments.

The troops patrolled the meanest streets of Mogadishu with a soft touch.

Children waved as they passed or ran to shake hands with those who had come to help.
Theirgoal was to provide safe passage for food delivery to starving Somalis.

Closer to home, the country focused on the devastating forces mother nature brought to bear.

Hurricane Andrew struck southern Florida on Aug. 24. 1992, with winds gusting to 164 mph and a 12 -foot tidal surge that flattened many homes, uprooted trees. flung boats into the streets and wrecked an Air Force base.

The hurricane continued on. carving its way through the plantation country of Louisiana, throwing tornadoes like darts at a 100 -mile-wide target and pumping torrents of rain at stormweary Louisianans.

Fifty-five deaths were directly or indirectly linked to the hurricane 41 in Florida, 10 in Louisiana and four in the Bahamas.
The hurricane's 54hour rampage, the most
expensive natural disaster ever in the country. caused an estimated $\$ 20$ billion damage in Florida, S1.5 billion in Louisiana and $\$ 250$ million in the Bahamas.
"It's like a bomb hit." said one Florida City resident, looking at the rematns of the trailer park

large video screens as he a ccepted $t h e$ presidential nomination during the Re-
publican National Convention at the Houston Astrodome on Aug. 20, 1992. Bush struck a new defiant tone in his acceptance speech - a marked contrast to the 1988 oration in which he promised a "kinder and gentler nation."
Selling his vision for the next four years. President Bush said, if given a new term, he would propose an across-the-board tax cut to the new Congress that would convene in January 1993. He said the tax cuts would have to be offset by spending reductions, which he did not specify, to keep from swelling the deficit.

Bush and Vice President Dan Quayle roused the GOP delegates to cheers as they accepted their party's nominations for a second
term. Bush vowed to go to "every corner of this nation" in the political fight of his life to beat Bill Clinton and "clear out the deadwood" in Congress.
The 1992 Presidential elections were anything but ordinary, thanks to the man representing the independent party. H . Ross Perot. In May 1992, Ross Perot was a potential president, but then he withdrew from the race. The Perot Factor was reintroduced to presidential politics 11 weeks
to the day after the Texas billionaire abandoned plans to run, saying he had concluded he could not win. Many analysts view his re-entry as a selfish attempt at redemption by a political novice who failed to realize what he was getting into months earlier and then wanted to heal a wounded ego.

As he rejoined the race, Perot said he was running to win. Whatever his motivation - Perot affected the race even if he never left third place.

As the results rolled in from around the country

W\&L entered the final week ranked 10th in Division III and needing a win over archrival Roanoke to return to the NCAA Division III tournament. The bad weather early in the season had forced the postponement of the Roanoke game to the final week and the stage was set for a thriller. Roanoke came to Wilson Field ranked third in the country and coming off a 40goal outburst against Va. Wesleyan. The Generals pulled off the upset 9-8 to the delight of a large W\&L gathering. Senior John Hunter scored three firstquarter goals to stake W\&L to a lead it would never relinquish and senior Brian Murtagh was unflappable in goal. making 18 saves.

Two days later the Generals romped over VMI 183 in the sixth annual Lee-Jackson Classic behind a school record-tying eight goals from senior Wiemi Douoguih to finish the regular season 12-2.

The wins vaulted W\&L into the tournament where they headed to Ohio Wesleyan for a quarterfinal matchup. The game was a defensive standstill for three quarters. But the Bishops proved too much for W\&L, and the Generals fell 8-7.

Douoguih was named the ODAC Player of the Year after tallying 50 goals (third most in school history) and 26 assists. He was joined on the allconference team by Hunter. Murtagh and semiors Josh Levinson and Kirk Olsen.

W\&L won the regular-season ODAC title with a thrilling win at Roanoke on senior Paige Henke's goal. The Generals and Roanoke met for the second time in a week to decide the championship. With about 10 seconds left. junior Angie Carrington picked up a loose ball at midfield and raced toward the Roanoke goal. Carrington fed sophomore Nicole Ripken who scored the tie-breaking, winning goal with one second left to give the Generals their ODAC title and trip to the NCAA Tournament.
