V.P.I. Loses to W. & L.

THE THIRD SUCCESSIVE TIME

Score, W. & L. 7; V. P. I. 3

One of the cleanest and best played games of baseball in which our team has ever figured was played in Roanoke last Tuesday with the team from V. P. I.

Early Tuesday morning the spirit of college patriotism became manifest. Our boys—about 50 strong—provided themselves with ribbons and horns and began the noise.

The same spirit was immediately taken up by the alumni; the lobby of the Ponce de Leon was soon filled with the friends of the White and Blue, who early became enthused with the same loyal faith in the team.

Two large tally-hos from the Virginia College draped in white and blue and filled with pretty girls, representing the Iota Pi and Alpha Nu Sigma fraternities, drove through the streets of the city giving an inflection to "chie-a-go-runk" that fired the hearts of our boys with a renewed determination to win. This rooting was carried from the city to the athletic grounds where at 3.30 the game was begun.

The first inning was a quiet one; a test of strength. Alexander started the game with a hit. He was sacrificed to second by Dawson, and to third by Shields. Wilson walked and LeGore flew out to left.

V.P.I. in her half got first on a wild throw from third but the following three men were retired in one, two, three order, LeGore winning the applause of the crowd by a long running catch of St. Clair's fly.

2nd. Inning.—Pipes, Hereford, and Trimble were early retired.

Nieley got a base on a blocked ball which with Butler's scratch and Fitzpatrick's hit gave them two runs. Dickerman held his nerve however and retired the side, three dying on bases. For once V.P.I. was in the ascendancy with two runs to our none.

3rd Inning.—Alexander took first

base for the second time; Dawson walked; Shields walked, and "Alex." scored on a passed ball. "Riley" came in for an opportune hit, and Dawson and Shields scored. Wilson later scored on a passed ball and the side was retired.

The Polytech., with the exception of a hit by Miles, was retired in one, two and three order, leaving leaving score 4 to 2 in our favor.

Fourth Inning.—Trimble, Dickerman and Alexander were retired. "Dick" got a hit but was caught napping at 2nd.

In the Blacksburg half Butler and Bache each got a hit, and it began to look like a run, with two men on bases and one out. Our infield got to work at this point, however. Dawson stopped two hot ones and passed them to Wilson, retiring the side.

5th Inning.—W. & L. went out without a base. Rose of Blacksburg, deserves mention for capturing Shields' long drive.

Miles got his usual base and by a combination of scratch hits scored. W. & L. 4; V. P. I. 3.

6th Inning.—LeGore made a clean hit, was sacrificed to second by Shields and to third by Hereford, and scored on a passed ball. Trimble retired the side.

Bache led off with a hot drive. Hereford stopped it, but threw wild to first. This, though technically an error, was such an excellent stop that recovery was difficult. Then came the features of the game.

"Alex." and Shafer's fly began a race for deep centre. "Peck" spurted for 30 yards, whirled around and silenced the Blacksburg rooters forevermore. Bache had reached third on his way home, but "Alex." dropped the ball into Wilson's hand before Bache had learned how it happened. St. Clair flew out to Dawson. Score, Varsity 5, Polytech. 3.

7th Inning.—Both sides went out without results, Miles getting a hit but dying on 1st.

8th Inning.—Shield got a hit

Baseball Team Goes North

The baseball will go on another tour next week, which will be by far the most extensive of all the trips taken by our teams in past seasons. The managers, Messrs. Withers and Steves, are to be congratulated on the strong schedule which they have just completed.

Stopping in Lynchburg on Monday night the team will be able to arrive at the University of Virginia on the Southern at about 9 o'clock on Tuesday playing there the same afternoon, and leaving at 7 o'clock by the Southern again in the evening for Washington where they will stop at the Ebbitt House. Though not definitely engaged, a game will be played on Wednesday afternoon with either Columbian or Gallaudet. Columbian will be played on its grounds on Thursday afternoon.

Leaving Washington immediately after the Columbian game the team will go to Annapolis where they will play St. John's Friday and U. S. Naval Academy Saturday.

Spending Sunday, the 27th, in Washington and playing Columbian again on Monday, and perhaps Gallaudet or Georgetown on Tuesday, the team will return home through Staunton on Tuesday or Wednesday morning.

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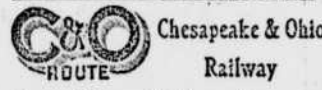
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
