The Athletic Association therefore feels that it will be wiser to abolish the grid-graph altogether than to continue to run it under the present conditions. They did-and in such a manner as to get control and elect students to the position of moderator and clerk. Well, the town of Hanover was soon on record as having voted for a brick school house, 500 feet long, 10 feet high, and two feet wide, and to build a plank walk from Reid Hall in Hanover to Lebanon, where there was a girls' school. For many years after that the Dartmouth students were not worried by the tax
