Blue Trackmen Are Outclassed By Terp Team

Generals Take Only Three Firsts in Dismal Opener

Taking first places in but three events, Washington and Lee's track team bowed to a well-balanced and strong University of Maryland squad, 87-39, in the opening meet of the season last Saturday.

Jimmy Rogers and Bill Higgins were the leading point scorers for the Generals, each taking a first and a second for eight points. Charlie Brasher also counted a first for the Blue and White with a discus throw of 117 feet, 4 1-2 inches.

Bob Kingsbury's spectacular stretch drive for second place in the half-mile run was the most thrilling event of the afternoon, however. Coming into the home stretch, trailing Gibbs of Maryland by five yards, Kingsbury turned on the heat and just overtook the Maryland star at the finish line to tie for second place.

After a shaky first inning, the Brigadier baseball team came from behind to defeat Roosevelt high school Saturday afternoon, 4-2.

Hampered by the lack of practice the freshmen found it difficult to give Johnny Dill, the starting pitcher, good fielding support on easy grounders. Dill, himself, was wild, walking three of the opposition and hitting one of the high school lads in the two innings he worked.

Coach Young supplanted Dill with O'Connor who received better support afield than his predecessor. The real surprise was Dart who relieved O'Connor in the sixth and received credit for the victory. Dart kept the Roosevelt team at bay until the ninth inning, at which time the bases were loaded with two out. Dart then struck out Trezanowan for the final out.

It wasn't until the fourth inning that the Brigadiers found their batting eye and scored a run. From then on the frosh pecked at Bdver and Mallos for runs in the fifth, sixth, and seventh innings to sew up the game.

The Roosevelt high team was only able to hit the offerings of the three freshman pitchers for a total of two singles. Al Davis and Bobby Watts hit the ball hard for the first yearmen, and Dunlap showed that he is capable of handling the pitchers from behind the plate.

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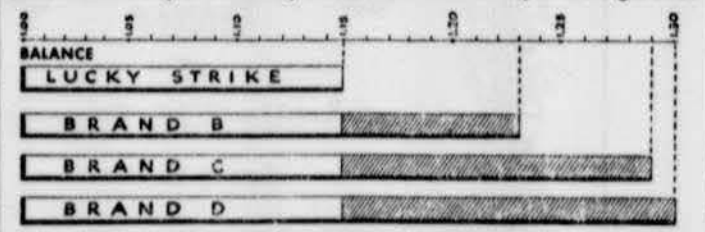
