

General Netmen Enter Tournery

Radcliffe and McCardell Leave for S. Conference Tournament

Bud Radcliffe, captain of the Generals' netmen, and Max McCardell left yesterday to compete in the Southern Conference tennis tournament at Chapel Hill. Coach Crenshaw accompanied them on the trip.

Both Radcliffe and McCardell will enter the singles event, while they will pair together in the doubles. Coach Crenshaw's ace doubles team, which has been undefeated so far this season, are considered as real threats in the doubles competition. North Carolina is favored to win the conference title.

Although hampered greatly by the loss of the number 1 and 2 players, the Big Blue netmen are prepared for the invasion of the V. P. I. Gobblers tomorrow afternoon. The match will start at two o'clock. The probable line-up for the Generals will be Stuart Reynolds, Jules Garber, George Meier, Eddie Epstein, and Dave Smith. The two doubles teams will be Reynolds and Meier and Garber and Smith.

The Generals played good tennis Wednesday to defeat the Emory & Henry Wasps, 5-2. In the feature match of the afternoon Wilcher of the Wasps downed Stuart Reynolds after two hard-fought 8-6 sets. The Generals won three singles and both doubles to score their five victories.
