They will be: Howard Blakeslee, science editor of the Associated Press, who will speak on "Covering Science for the Newspapers," and Edward S. Stanley, executive assistant of the Associated Press, who will speak on "Pictorial Journalism."

Immediately following the morning sessions will be the meetings of the delegates divided into sections according to the type of publication they represent. At 2:30 will be the trip to Natural Bridge.

At the final banquet at the Robert E. Lee hotel Saturday night the featured speakers will be Dr. Frances P. Gaines and Dr. Percival Cole, of the University of Sydney, Sydney, Australia, who addressed the freshman meeting on Thursday night.

Visiting Educator Speaks On History and People Of Australia

Visiting Professor Percival R. Cole spoke to the freshman class last night on the general subject of Australia, its history and its people.

Beginning with the paradox that it is the newest and the oldest country in the world, Dr. Cole pointed out that, geographically speaking, Australia is the oldest and by virtue of civilization it is the newest. It contains many beautiful wild flowers and the oldest specimens of animals to be found on earth.

"As far as population goes," he went on, "Australia welcomes the white peoples and excludes the Asiatics."
