By dint of hard and timely hitting the North Carolina State Wolfpack overcame the Generals Tuesday afternoon by a score of 12 to 2 in the first of a two-game series between the two schools. Redfern, the State portsider, had the Generals' stick wielders at his mercy during the whole game and only three safties were collected off him. Hawkins got a single, Gwaltney a double and Lackey connected with one of the reverse side pitcher's slow balls in the eighth inning for a home run. This was probably the longest hit that has been made on Wilson field this year. It went far over the center

### FACULTY GRANTS HOLIDAY FOR THE CONVENTION

#### Date Undecided As Yet--Meeting of State Chairmen Held Tonight.

The Democratic Convention seems to be assured if the granting of a holiday for its fulfillment has such an effect. The Faculty in session decided it of sufficient importance to declare a holiday, the exact date of which will be left to President Smith, the Executive Committee of the Faculty, and President Whittle to name. In conjunction these will decide on the most suitable occasion.

In view of the grant, the committee arranging the affair has called a meeting of the state chairmen, who were designated in a former issue of the Ring-tum Phi, to be held tonight in Newcomb Hall at 7:30. Among these men will be the final preparations be made for carrying out the idea. From the interest manifested upon the announcement sometime ago of the possibility of such an event, full support will be forthcoming from these chairmen and the Student Body at large.

The outcome of the proceedings in some detail will in all probability be reported to the New York papers where the real Democratic convention is to be held, and to the larger papers of the surrounding district. Washington and Lee will, as far as information can be garnered, be the pioneer in such student movement this year and because of this public interest will be aroused to a considerable extent.

### FOR VICE-PRESIDENT OF STUDENT BODY



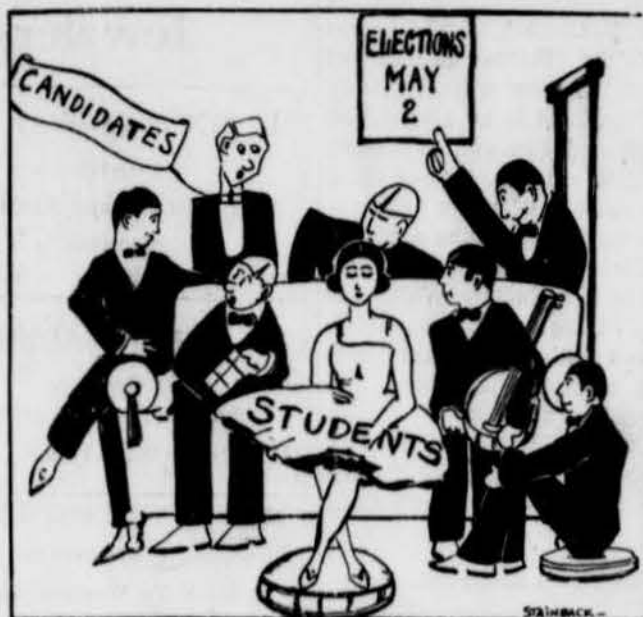
KAY THOMAS

**VIRGINIA SCIENCE ACAD. HOSTS TO CHEMICAL BODY**

The Virginia Academy of Science will be the host of the Virginia section of The American Chemical Society on next Friday and Saturday, May 2 and 3.

Business meetings will be held in the Physics lecture room in Reid Hall on both days. A buffet luncheon will be served to the guests in the Y. M. C. A.

The Student Body and citizens of the community are invited to attend all of the meetings, but will be especially interested in a meeting held in Lee Chapel on Friday evening at 7:30.

The chief speaker of the meeting will be Dr. S. C. Lind, Chief Chemist of the United States Bureau of Mines, whose subject will be "Radio Activity." Dr. Lind is an alumnus of Washington and Lee and of Boston Tech and following graduation there worked a number of years in European laboratories, including that of Madame Curie in Paris. He has been in charge of the Radium Works for the United States government and is a recognized authority on this very interesting subject.

Following the address on Friday evening the President and Faculty will hold a reception in the library for the visiting scientists and their wives.

Delta Alpha is a new radio fraternity, the first of its kind, that has made its appearance at Washington State College.

**FRESHMEN EASILY DEFEAT FISHBURNE**

In Initial Track Meet of the Season For the Yearling Cinder Squad.

In the initial meet of the season Thursday the Washington and Lee Freshman track team defeated Fishburne on Wilson Field by the score of 80 1-2 to 36 1-2. The Frosh received very little competition on the track, winning all first places and a majority of the seconds and thirds. In the field events Fishburne showed up much better, winning the broad jump, shot put, high jump, and several seconds and thirds.

This being the first meet of the season the Freshmen showed up exceptionally well, especially Millbank in the hundred, Gordon in the quarter and half, and Van Horn in the hundred, two-hundred, broad jump, and discus. His discus throw of one hundred fifteen feet came within one foot of tying the school record held by Lewis of one hundred sixteen feet. Van Horn was high point man for the Frosh with twelve points while Millbank and Gordon came second with ten points each. With this experience and one week of training they should be in good condition for their meets with A. M. A. and Fork Union next week.

**SELF-GOVERNMENT IS TOPIC OF ASSEMBLY**

President Smith Principal Speaker At Student Body Assembly Held Monday In Gym.

At the compulsory assembly Monday, called by the faculty at the request of the Executive Committee for the purpose of bringing before the Student Body matters with which they are concerned, Dr. Smith and three students spoke.

"Campus Self-Government" was the subject on which Dr. Smith talked and in connection with which he brought out many interesting points. He said that self-government is the life-principle of democracy, but that it must be given to a people gradually. He considers campus self-government the best possible preparation for American citizenship, and he thinks the local conditions here at Washington and Lee exceptionally favorable for its development and maintenance.

Several incidents were cited to show how our present self-government and honor system are exciting wide attention throughout the country, both being known wherever W. and L. men are known.

Dr. Smith said that high-minded leadership in campus self-government is the best possible preparation for leadership in the self-governing Democracy of the United States and that the privilege of holding an executive position on the campus is the greatest beneficial experience in college.

The assembly was turned over to "Booze" Whittle who, after giving the Executive Committee's reasons for requesting the Faculty to call the assembly, introduced "General" Stump, who spoke on our relations to V. M. I. and a solution of the problems arising from them.

"Johnnie" Lovelace spoke in behalf of the action taken by the Executive Committee and he urged that students lend greater co-operation in apprehending and convicting violators of the honor system. He said that the Executive Committee considered bootlegging a breach of the honor system.

The proposed amendments to the Student Body Constitution regarding the freshman ownership of automobiles was explained by Earl Bibb. He brought out the fact that many other colleges have this restriction and that if the Student Body doesn't take action it is only a question of time before the Faculty will.

Bowman, Syracuse University track star and indoor intercollegiate sprint champion, won three firsts in a track meet in which Syracuse, Naval Academy and University of Virginia participated. He won the 100 yard, the 220 yard dash, and the broad jump.

Hereafter, according to new faculty regulations at Harvard, the Freshman class will be limited to a thousand, and unless an exceptional case, no student will be admitted to advanced standing without extraordinary qualifications.

The Second Annual Southern Conference track and field meet will be held May 9 and 10, at Montgomery, Mississippi A. and M., 1923 winners, are said to be strong this year. Louisiana State, runner-up for the Georgia Tech 1923 challenge trophy, will have a strong aggregation. A new-comer in the conference, Sewanee University, has a flashy team and is expected to make the going hot for the best of the entries.

Other strong entries include Georgia Tech, Vanderbilt, South Carolina, Maryland, Washington and Lee, Alabama, Tulane, and Florida.

The baseball team of Meiji University, Tokio, Japan, will begin a tour of America, playing many of the leading college teams in this country during the college months.

Meiji won the championship of Japan, but there was some doubt about the trip, as all the buildings of the university were destroyed by the earthquake.

Games scheduled with Eastern colleges include Princeton, Yale, Pennsylvania, New York University, and Boston.

**FRESHMAN TRACK MEN DEFEAT FORK UNION**

Beckwith of Fork Union Is High Scorer—Frosh Win By 69 To 47 Score.

The Washington and Lee Freshmen defeated Fork Union Tuesday afternoon in a dual track meet on Wilson Field by the score of 69 1-2 to 47 1-2. The meet was well conducted and well attended and proved thoroughly interesting throughout.

The Little Generals obtained the lead in the first event, when Milbank, although set back a yard for starting before the gun, finished the 100 yard run in the fine time of 10 1-5. Fork Union forged ahead by winning first and second places in the 440 yard run, but a few minutes later, Bowker regained the lead by winning the hurdles and from then on the Generals remained in the lead.

Beckwith of Fork Union was the high scorer of the meet with eleven points, all of which he gained in the dashes with two seconds and one first. The next high scorers were Milbank of Washington and Lee with two first in the dashes and Bowker with two firsts in the hurdles.

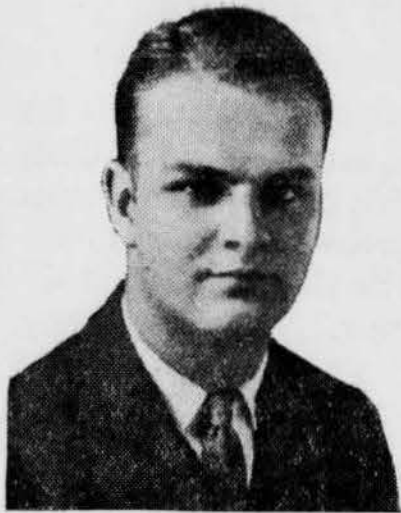
