

ELEVEN AIMING AT EMORY AND HENRY

Little "Dope" On Visitors; Potts and Walters Injured But May Play.

With the Randolph-Macon game disposed of, the Big Team is now directing its attention to "taking a fall" out of Emory and Henry, who will be here Saturday. Coach Raftery is not making any boastful predictions as to how much the Generals will defeat the down-state aggregation, but he expects to have his men in good condition and on edge for this game, prepared for a real fight. Little is known here of the strength of Emory and Henry, except that they held Tennessee to three touchdowns in their opening encounter, and on last Saturday defeated Milligan 31-6. This would indicate that they have somewhat of a scoring machine, and will come here expecting to put it in operation against the "Fighting Generals." As to what progress they will make remains to be seen, but certain it is that they will oppose a team believed by many to be the strongest outfit Washington and Lee has had for many years.

Most of the local players came through the opening game in good condition, although a few of them are nursing minor injuries and have been ordered by the trainer "to take it easy" for a few days. Potts, whose playing was a feature of Saturday's game, has a bad side and has not been reporting for practice this week. He may be able to get into the Emory and Henry game, but unless his injury is much better, Coach Raftery will take no chances, and possibly will send Tilson to right tackle in his place. Walters, the husky guard, is also out of the game temporarily with an injured back, but will probably be in shape for Saturday's contest. Aside from these, the squad is in good condition and the line-up will practically be intact for the Emory and Henry game.

Coaches Raftery, Shultz and Silverstein are devoting their time this week to correcting weaknesses displayed in the Randolph-Macon game, and trying out some new formations. Although every man on the team played a consistent game last Saturday, the coaches noted a few weaknesses, and are working hard to eliminate these, so as to have a smooth-running machine by the time the more important games on the schedule are played. The line particularly is receiving a lot of attention this week from line coach Shultz, and their offensive work Sat-

E. P. Twombly Will Have Charge of Swimming in Doremus Gym; Will Assist Brett.

E. P. Twombly, pitcher for the White Sox, has come from the North to fill a position as instructor in the Department of Physical Education. Mr. Twombly's purpose at Washington and Lee is to coach swimming and to instruct the physical side of the Sophomore activities, as well as to assist Coach Brett in moulding a Freshman football team that will make the season a big success.

For five years he has served on college baseball teams, pitching for Lehigh in the game with W. & L. in 1917, which he won by a 1 to 0 score. Afterwards he attended Springfield College, being captain of the baseball team and assistant coach. Two years ago he was with the St. Louis Nationals and last summer he pitched for the White Sox. He pitched his first league ball game against St. Louis, coming out on top, and later held Cleveland in a hard fought battle to a 1 to 0 victory.
