BEMIS DROP KICKS GOAL WITH SIX MINUTES TO GO

Generals Gain 207 Yards to 171 Yards of Opponents--Both Teams Use Aerial Attack Near End

By the sufficient margin of one field goal expertly propelled across the bar in the last six minutes of play by the good right foot of Sir Thomas Bemis did the Fighting Generals down the eleven from Blacksburg in the annual Southern gridiron classic before 6,750 spectators in Lynchburg Saturday.

'Twas a mighty battle, mates, but the result tells the tale. For three hectic quarters the oval cruised up and down the field from our 27 yard line to their 16 yard marker. Then from midfield "Monk" Mattox heaved a long pass to Bemis thirty yards away. Three further aerial endeavors followed and then the versatile left end stepped back to receive the somewhat inaccurate pass from "Pat" Collins and presented to Washington and Lee the trio of units that spelled victory.

Verily, it was a scrap. The Tech team was a powerful aggregation, outplaying the victors during the second quarter and equalling their play in the third. The Generals outclassed them during the first and final periods. The Blacksburg shift was working perfectly while the Tech interference was superb. Only the ability of the Big Line to tighten whenever there was even a semblance of danger served to blank our opponents for the third consecutive time in as many years and continue the clean record of wins since 1910. Nevertheless, they made one more first down than we did, securing nine while we accomplished eight. We surpassed them when the battle was fought in the air but did not reach our top form, completing but four of the seventeen passes attempted but they were successful when success was most in demand.

In that game of thrills, stars and line-up were synonymous. Scintillating most brightly, though, were the brilliant Bemis, Tucker, who intercepted several hostile passes and who made some spectacular gains, Cameron, who smashed the V. P. I. line with the most successful consistency, Rangely, who smeared play after play headed in his direction, and Mattox, who fought nobly and plunged with demon-like consistency. For Tech, Gettle starred on the offense while Sutton reeled off several pretty runs. Defensively, Captain Tilson, Hardwick, and Hess shone with a brilliance that was admirable.

Game In Detail.

First Quarter: Tilson, V. P. I., kicked off, McDonald making the catch and returned 8 yards. Mattox failed to gain through left tackle; McDonald made 6 thru center; Cameron, substituted for McDonald at full, carried the ball in three successive plays, making 2 thru left tackle, 5 thru center and failed to gain in a rush on right tackle. Tucker made 3 thru right tackle; Cameron 5 thru center; and Frew followed with a 1 yard gain thru center. Mattox attempted a pass to Bemis, which failed but on second trial the play netted a 5 yard gain. Sheppard caught Mattox behind the line and the ball went to the Gobblers on downs. For

V. P. I., Wallace made 3 thru center and Gettle 3 thru center, but on second attempt to carry the ball thru the same position Hess failed to gain and redeemed himself by punting 40 yards to Tucker, who was downed after returning 7 yards. Herndon made 1 thru left tackle; Cameron 3 thru center, and Tucker 3 around left end. Frew punted 30 yards to Wallace, who was unable to return. Sutton made 6 around right end; Gettle 6 thru left tackle; Wallace 2 thru center; Sutton 4 around right end; pass to Wilson incomplete; Hess punted 20 yards. W. and L.'s ball 65 yards from the objective. Tucker made 4 around left end; Cameron 1 thru left tackle; Mattox 6 thru center; Tucker 2 thru left tackle; Cameron 2 thru left tackle; pass, Mattox to Herndon, over left wing, netted 20 yards; Mattox 15 around left end; Cameron 1 thru center; Cameron 3 thru left tackle; Mattox 2 thru left tackle. With the line of scrimmage on the 20 yard line, Mattox attempted a pass to Leake over the goal line, the ball hitting Leake's shoulder and bouncing back. V. P. I. had the ball on the 20 yard line going back; Wallace made 4 around left end and followed with 3 thru center; Hess 1 thru center; Hess punted to the 45 yard line. Mattox made 2 thru left tackle and Tucker netted 13 thru the same course. Quarter ended, ball in W. and L.'s possession on V. P. I.'s 40 yard line.

Second Quarter: Mattox 3 thru right tackle; pass to Leake failed; attempted long pass, Mattox to Leake, broken. V. P. I.'s ball. Gettle made 8 thru left tackle, Wallace 3 thru center; Hess 2 thru left tackle and Hess 1 thru center; pass to Tilson incomplete. Hess punted 40 yds. to Tucker, who returned 5 yards. Cameron made 3 thru center; Mattox 1 thru center; Frew punted 40 yards to Sutton, who returned 5 yards. Gettle made 5 thru right tackle; Hess 6 thru left tackle; Gettle 5 thru left tackle; Sutton 4 around right end; Wallace 2 thru left tackle; Gettle 1 thru center; forward pass broken by Potts; pass intercepted by Rangely, who carried the ball back 3 yards. The Freshman eleven met defeat last Friday, this time at the hands of the heavier Augusta Military Academy team. The game ended with the "Midget Generals" in possession of the smaller end of a 14 to 7 score.

The Freshmen scored first in the second quarter when Salmon received a punt on his own goal line and behind perfect interference ran the length of the field through the A. M. A. warriors for the first tally. Taliaferro kicked goal.

A. M. A. was unable to score during the first three quarters, but in the fourth put an entirely new team on the field and succeeded in pushing over two touchdowns through the exhausted Freshman line. Their first tally came after a long penalty which placed the ball on the W. & L. one yard line. With their superior weight they were able to shove the ball over after several attempts. The second touchdown came in the same quarter by the use of straight football. Both goals were kicked.

Jennings and Walters starred on the Freshman line and Salmon and Taliaferro in the backfield.

For A. M. A. McClanahan and Bernheim showed up well in the defense while L. Lewis took the honors of the offense.
