Tech put together two singles for a run in the first inning. W-L retaliated with two in the second, only to have the invaders tie the score in the fourth.

Humphrey, Thompson, Simpson, and O'Connor collected two hits each to head the Generals, while Pierce, Tech's all-state football player, slammed out two of the hits off O'Connor to pace the losing cause.

Veech Doesn't Plan Constructing Any Bomb-Proofs Soon

Superintendent J. Alexander Veech of the Washington and Lee university grounds is usually prepared for anything in his mailbox—but what he found there yesterday had him scratching his head.

He blinked on opening his mail yesterday and discovering a series of pamphlets and descriptive booklets on the construction of bomb-proof shelters and further features of air-raid protection. Published by a British firm, they were addressed to the "Engineering department" of Washington and Lee.

Of course, they went to Veech, who daily gets every type of literature from anti-Japanese propaganda to descriptions in German of Nazi organization.

"Anything they don't know what to do with they give to me," he explained laughingly yesterday.

No, the superintendent said yesterday — he isn't planning on building any bomb-proofs soon.

Bill Read Plans Larger Council; More Activity

All Students Interested In Christian Work May Join Group

A sweeping enlargement and revision of the Washington and Lee Christian council was announced last night by Bill Read, president of the body.

The plan, which will go into effect sometime in May, calls for the inclusion of as many students as are interested in the work of the council, with an executive committee of 12 members, including the president, vice-president and secretary, to be elected by the larger body from its members, after being nominated from the council.

Any member of the larger council, according to the new rules, who misses three meetings of the group will automatically be dropped from the roll.

participation in Christian activities on the campus and is willing to work may volunteer for membership in the council by handing in his name to Read or to Harry Philpott, director of religious activities.

Reason for the change, as outlined by Read, was a feeling among Christian council officers that the present small group of 18 members are not reaching enough students, and that a larger number could be contacted by an expansion of the size of the group of active participants.

"We hope that this group will serve as a nucleus to come in contact with all members of the student body and thereby make the work of the Christian council more effective," Read said.

"We want to emphasize that this will not be just a big club, but a group of boys who are willing to work. Unless a student is able to devote a large part of his time to the activities of the Christian council we would prefer that he not become a member."

Playing today and Wednesday at the State theatre is "Love Affair," starring Irene Dunne and Charles Boyer.

Apparently a rather unassuming show, the plot of "Love Affair" deals with nothing more than a romantic interlude between a European fortune-hunter (Boyer) and a Kansas night-club singer (Irene Dunne). Even so, it has enough appeal to make every female in the audience heave wistful sighs. And although the pace falters in spite, it will also be well received by the men in the audience.

"Love Affair" is, for the most part, a well-directed and well-acted show.

"Cafe Society," the movie producers' gentle thrust at Manhattan's supposedly gayest set, will appear at the State on Thursday and Friday. It presents Fred MacMurray as the hard-working, conscientious young reporter, and Shirley Ross as the girl. Madeline Carroll weds MacMurray to win a bet, and thereupon the trouble begins. It doesn't cease until MacMurray has subdued Carroll, and the two of them decide to live happily ever after.

Although "Cafe Society" is not too cleverly handled as a satire, it does have several excellent lines and some splendid acting by a well-chosen cast. On the whole, it turns out to be an amusing comedy based on the "early to wed but late to bed" theme.
