Next Week . . .
Just how the Comets will stack up against the cream of the Southern conference basketball crop will be determined next week when they meet the top place Wake Forest Deacons and the second place Maryland Terrapins. Those demon deacons from Wake Forest, led by their sensational conference high scoring forward Waller, will be played in Danville next Thursday night. Wake Forest has lost only two games in nine starts, those to Duke and Carolina by a close margin. Wrestlers Will Meet NCU Here Monday

Five Out of Eight General Starters Are Experienced Lettermen

Blue Hurt By Lack of Practice During Exams; Tarheels Strong

Washington and Lee's varsity wrestling team, potentially one of the most powerful outfits turned out during Coach Archie Mathis' entire tenure of coaching, will be bombarding along the Southern conference front Monday night when they tangle with the University of North Carolina grapplers here in Doremus gym. Prior to this, the yearling combinations of the two schools will face each other, with the first bout scheduled for 7:30.

The Generals appear to have plenty on the ball. Five out of the eight men whom Coach Mathis intends to start against the Tarheels are letter men. And in their only meet of the season, the Big Blue looked anything but bad while trouncing the Richmond YMCA matmen. But the outlook is not quite as rosy as it may seem, and Coach Mathis is far from being ready to predict any kind of win for his charges.

The recent examination period has not added anything to the condition of the Generals. Practice has been almost completely curtailed during the past ten days, and the late hours kept while studying have prevented the Big Blue from reaching anything like top-notch condition.

The whole affair adds up into one big "if." If the Generals are able to get into shape by Monday, and if they show the fine form which they displayed against the Richmond "Y," the Tarheels are in for quite a big assignment. But should they not be up to par, in the opinion of Coach Mathis, "we're in for one of the biggest lickings of our lives."

the first meet of the year for the freshmen. Very little can be determined as to their possibilities, because the team has not been definitely chosen as yet. There is still a wide open fight for practically all of the positions.

Captain Bob Kemp, the Big Blue's crack 128-pounder and Southern conference champion, will head the list of varsity starters. Harry Crane, a letter-winner, will represent W-L in the 121-pound class. Captain Kemp is the 128 representative, while George McInerney will patrol the 136-pound sector. McInerney is also a monogram winner.

Either Jack Broom, who earned his varsity spurs last year, or Ralph Hausrath, a newcomer, will dig in for the 145-pounders. Which ever one chosen will be replacing the injured Ed Wagg, who is out with a twisted knee.

Von Kallinowski is slated to get the 155-pound assignment, but there is a possibility that Charley Bowles will get the call over the Von. Barney Farrier is dead certain to get the starting call in the 165-pound class as is Henry Braun in the 175 division. Both boys are veterans. Al Szymanski will go to bat for the heavyweights.

The Generals will face their second test in three days when they face the grapplers from Northwestern university here Wednesday.

Blue Swimmers Open With VPI Here Thursday

Freshman 200-Yard Relay Team Clips Pool Record To 1:34.9

Slowed down by two weeks of examinations, Washington and Lee's varsity swimmers will get back to work early next week in preparation for their debut against VPI. The meet with the Gobblers is listed for the home waters next Thursday.

The freshman mermen, who opened their season with a 47-19 win over Fishburne last week, face two meets during the coming week. They are scheduled to swim at Staunton next Wednesday, and will entertain Bucknell Junior college here next Saturday.

Coach Cy Twombly isn't too happy about the varsity's prospects for the coming campaign. "We haven't lost a meet in four or five seasons," he said yesterday, "but you can't go on forever, and it looks like this year is going to be our stopping place."

Record Broken
Breaking of a pool record by the 200-yard relay team featured the freshmen's win over Fishburne last Saturday. The yearling quartet of Bruce Dunfield, Bob Schultz, Evans Jasper, and Ed Samara turned in a 1:34.9 for the distance, bettering by more than a second the old mark of 1:36, established by a varsity quartet in 1936.

Samara and Mike Watt placed first and third in the 50-yard free style. Pitzer and Baugher finished one-two in the 50-yard breast stroke, while Schultz and Pfuhl came in second and third, respectively, in the 220. Dunfield copped first place in the century, followed by Jasper, while Mulheisen and Pitzer placed second and third in the back stroke.

Mulheisen, Baugher, and Pitzer shared legs on the victorious 150-yard medley relay team, while Stahl came out on top in the dive.

Former Fancy Dress Presidents Starred in Big Blue Athletics

Football, basketball, baseball, wrestling, swimming, and crew—yes, many of those stately gentlemen you have seen leading Washington and Lee's Fancy Dress figures in the past have participated in these sports.

Hard as it may seem to realize, those same Fancy Dress presidents who led the figure in immaculately tailored red-velvet tail-coats, with crisp, white-frilled collars, dainty cotton knee-stockings, and shining black shoes but a few months before were slipping and sliding around in the gridiron's mud, or had just finished a hard session of basketball, swimming, or wrestling practice.

Ten Years Ago
Beginning with the year 1928, a review of the athletic prowess of our Fancy Dress presidents reveals that William A. Woodley, basketball manager for the Big Blue five that season, was elected to lead the Fancy Dress ball. In 1931 it was W. H. Tallyn who headed the affair. Tallyn, a member of the Monogram club, was a mainstay among the General pugilistic contenders, and also pulled a mean fourth-man oar on the Albert Sidney shell.

It is said that Frank Bailey, Fancy Dress president in 1933, was one of the hardest hitting full-backs the Big Blue grid mentors have had here in quite a while. Bailey was also a member of the Monogram club.

It remained for Harvard P.

Smith, 1934 Fancy Dress president, to really put Big Blue athletics in "fancy dress" headlines. Smith was co-captain of the General matmen the year that Washington and Lee won the Southern conference wrestling title. He was 145-pound wrestling king, and won third place in the National Intercollegiate matches.

Isaac Shively carried on the wrestling tradition that Smith had initiated by occupying the same positions in 1936. Shively spent four years on Washington and Lee's "grunt and groan" outfit, and he climaxed his wrestling career here by taking the 145-pound wrestling championship of the Southern conference two years in a row.

Iler Leaves Record
Then came Norman Iler—the freshman that coaches said was too small to develop into an athlete. Iler was president of Fancy Dress in 1937. He was vice-president of the Athletic council. Not only did Iler play three years of varsity basketball, but each of these years found him on the "all-State" and "all-Southern conference" cage squads. He also gave a fine account of himself during his three years of varsity baseball at Washington and Lee.

Last year it was the Big Blue's football captain, Will Rogers, who headed the Fancy Dress dance sessions. And that brings us up to Cecil Taylor, senior manager of Washington and Lee's '39 football team, who will star tonight.

Rifle Squad Loses; Vanta Hits 273x300 To Break Record

The Big Blue Gunners of Washington and Lee dropped their first match to Boston university on un-lucky Friday, the thirteenth of January.

George Vanta sufficiently recovered his shooting eye to crack the range record by one point; his 273 out of a possible 300 is the highest score ever to be shot by a W-L man on the range. The team, which consists of five men, will probably be picked from the following: Captain John Goodin, Frank Glenn, George Vanta, Morry Spitz, Jr., Monty Horn, Al DeLong, and J. T. Perry.

Far from being a discouraging influence on the team, this initial competition has but served to double the efforts of the team in preparation for coming matches. Immediately following the week-end of Fancy Dress, the team will resume practice for matches with the Harvard, Yale, and Carnegie Tech's sharpshooters.
