

Dedication

IT IS WITH HUMBLE GRATITUDE AND GREAT PRIDE THAT WE DEDICATE THIS ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY BOOK TO ALL THOSE LIVING AND DEAD WHO HAVE UNTIRINGLY OVER THE PAST ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-FIVE YEARS LABORED HERE IN GOD'S VINEYARD TO LEAVE US AND FUTURE GENERATIONS THIS GREAT HERITAGE.

History of the Negro Baptist Church in Lexington VA 1867 - 1980

A number of Negroes worshiped in the Manley Memorial Church, the Episcopal Church and the Presbyterian Church. Negroes felt the need of a church of their own. Sermons were continuously preached from the text "Servants be obedient to your masters at all times." Being children of the living God, they realized that it was he to whom they owed allegiance. Loyal were they as slaves and servants but they longed for a supreme master, the true friend, the everlasting Father.

This body of worshipers was known as the Black Baptists. On September 22, 1867, the group was permitted to withdraw and organize as the Lexington African Baptist Church. They were counseled, best wishes were extended and friendly feelings prevailed. Meetings were held in many places prior to the church that stood on the land next to our present church (on the north side).

Reverend Milton Smith, who was reared in the community and baptized in the Manley Baptist Church in 1841, was their leader. He must have been to the early church as Moses was to the children of Israel. Reverend Smith led the group for five years. After Reverend Smith, the following ministers preached: Reverend Elliot, Reverend T.L. Jackson, Reverend G.B. Howard, Reverend Troy, Reverend J.L. Barksdale, Reverend H.M. Moss and Reverend G.T. Johnson. The church just mentioned was used approximately twenty-six years. The membership purchased the lot next to their church and decided to erect a new building.

Brother David Humbles gave the first \$25.00. Other courageous souls joining the crusade were Brother Lylburn Downing, Joe Edmonson, Harvey Harper, Hugh Harvey, Richard Osborne, Robert Price and Phillip Pryor. Many gifts were made by friends and the laborers. The previously mentioned and others gathered after working all day and dug the foundation. The women held lanterns to provide working light as there was not any electricity in Lexington. Later came the masons. They were the

Moores from Amherst, Virginia. Mr. Ira Poindexter, a Lexington citizen, helped them. Mr. Richard Jones and helpers were the carpenters, hence the edifice we now worship in became a reality.

On July 4, 1894, the cornerstone was laid. Members and friends worked hard under the leadership of the late Dr. W.J. Johnson.

The membership joined the Baptist General Association now known as the Baptist Allied Bodies, established in 1898. Virginia Union University was and continues to be for the training of young men religiously. We continued to support the ideas until 1955.

Monday night, September 29, 1905, was an exciting and interesting occasion at First Baptist Church. The record states that 1400 persons attended. The mortgage was paid and the bonds were burned by the bondsmen and the late Sadie Lewis. The late Reverend P.S. Lewis was the pastor. Addresses were made by Doctors Howard, Moss and Johnson who returned for the occasion. The late Reverend Charles Manley, Dr. Howe of Washington and Lee University and B.E. Vaughn, President of First National Bank, addressed the audience and emphasized the pleasant relations existing between the races in Lexington.

The pastors serving us in our present church as well as Reverend Scott, who is to be installed, follow: the late Dr. W.T Johnson, the late Dr. P.S. Lewis, the late Dr. Lucas, the late Reverend Carruthers, the late Reverend Tynes, the late Reverend Brinkley, the late Reverend Thurston, the late Reverend Gonslaves, the late Reverend Cook, the late Reverend Goodgame, Reverend Mitchell, Reverend Green, Reverend Crawford, Reverend Cooper, Reverend Sims, Reverend Cofield, Reverend Trotman, Reverend Rainey, Reverend Anthony and Reverend Scott.

Our accomplishments have been many. Our church is modernly equipped and inviting. The

gospel has been preached and souls have been won. We take this opportunity to thank all that have made us happy as we celebrate our 113th Anniversary. We pray that generations yet to be born will realize

the sacrifices made by our forefathers. May we press onward and upward dedicating ourselves to a greater service to God.

History of the First Baptist Church in Lexington VA 1980-1992

The newly appointed committee on history for 1992 and the 125th Anniversary of the First Baptist Church of Lexington, VA continues where Mrs. Laura Etta Rucker stopped in 1980.

In the year of 1980, the Reverend James H. Scott was called as the 27th pastor of the First Baptist Church since its beginning in 1867. The installation for Reverend Scott was held November 23 of that year. Since his home was in Staunton, VA, he continued to live there and commuted to Lexington each Sunday for worship services. Reverend Scott also attended all business meetings, funerals and weddings. He was a very good preacher. His sermons were short but always full of spirit. Many souls were saved during his time here. The main sanctuary was painted, a new roof was placed on the church, new carpet was laid on the floor and a new public speaking system was installed. Reverend Scott pastored here for five years, resigning in 1985. During his stay here, the church parsonage was rented to a military officer, who was stationed with the ROTC at Virginia Military Institute, and his family.

From time to time, a supply of ministers preached at First Baptist Church on most Sundays. Some were aspiring to become the pastor. Even so, the pulpit committee did not hear anyone that they agreed to present to the church. Later in 1985, an Air Force chaplain, Johnny Stewart, stationed at Virginia Military Institute in the ROTC Department, consented to supply the pulpit each Sunday at First Baptist Church as an interim pastor until the vacancy was filled or until his assignment at VMI was at an end. The membership continued to work together in harmony, though some were not completely satisfied with this arrangement. Reverend Stewart and his family stayed over a year. A banquet of appreciation was extended to him at the end of his Air Force assignment at VMI in November 1986.

Then, again, the members began hearing other ministers brought by the pulpit committee. One such

minister was our present pastor, the Reverend James B. Harris from Waynesboro, VA by way of Louisa, VA. He preached his first sermon after being called by the church on Sunday, April 5, 1987 and was installed as the pastor on Sunday, June 4 of that year.

This year, 1992, is Reverend Harris's fifth year as the 28th installed pastor of First Baptist Church. Many worthwhile efforts have been accomplished since he has been here. The membership has grown through baptism, Christian experience and by letter. A second choir has been organized by Reverend Harris, who serves here in the church and accepts engagements at other churches in the area. A Board of Christian Education was organized in 1990. The Budget and Finance Committee has been rejuvenated, the church restrooms have been remodeled and new doors now grace all the outside entrances of the church. The word of God is preached from the pulpit each Sunday morning for all who enter the sanctuary. Prayer meeting and Bible study are held at the church on Wednesday evenings with Reverend Harris as the leader. He works diligently on the spiritual aspects of the church.

Many highlights have transpired over these 125 years at the First Baptist Church. Just to name only a few:

- 1. On April 16, 1886, the Rockbridge County News, a local weekly paper, gave this account as current news:
 - "On last Sunday, about 75 converts of the First Baptist Church (colored) were baptized in the North River. It took one hour and was witnessed by at least 1000 people."

The Reverends Troy and Barkes were pastors in 1886.

2. The laying of the Cornerstone in this present church on July 4, 1894 certainly must have been a highlight as well as the first worship service in this new edifice.

- 3. The burning of the mortgage on May 28,1905 with such a great attendance. The Reverend P. S. Lewis was then pastor.
- 4. In May of 1931, the Negro Republican congressman Oscar De Priest from the first district of Chicago spoke at the First Baptist Church. He was hosted by the Walker Colored Women's Federation (no longer in existence). The Reverend John Goodgame was pastor.
- 5. In September of 1937, the Masonic Lodges of Virginia met at First Baptist Church for three days. The Reverend Corey Mitchell was pastor.
- 6. The Baptist General Sunday School Convention convened at this church in July 1952. The Reverend Peter Crawford had just been called.
- 7. The first homecoming was held on the second Sunday of August in 1965. Reverend Curtis Coefield was the pastor then.

The historical committee for the 125th Anniversary was unable to find any minute books or ledgers kept over the past years for a factual history of this church. It is hoped that as each year unfolds and as each ledger is completed that the writings of business meetings will be kept on file, either in the church office or some other safe place where committees may have access to them for information when needed.

The highlights written in the last section of the church history were taken from newspaper clippings, past church bulletins, the bondsmen picture in the main sanctuary, personal diaries and from memory. We feel that much is possibly missing from both of these history writings due to the lack of any church clerks minute books. Never the less, God has richly blessed this congregation for these past 125 years. We have been left a great heritage for future generations.

Upon This Rock : A Message from Our Pastor

The founding fathers of this church are to be commended for their insight and courage as they ventured into an unknown realm. That historic night of September 22, 1867, when the "colored members" of Manley Baptist Church asked for and obtained letters of dismission, stands as a monument for freedom we now enjoy. It took a great deal of fortitude to stand up for what those folks felt was right.

I am proud, but humbled, to be a part of the rich history of First Baptist as its current pastor. Words are inadequate to describe the joy I feel as being here to celebrate this grand experience with the membership.

I am sure that the founding fathers realized the hurdles and seeming insurmountable odds facing them as they took on the task of establishing a new church. In spite of this, they commandeered a spirit of faith that was unshakable and moved forward with the building of an organism that would affect the spiritual lives of African Americans in this area.

Now, today, 125 years later, the challenge has not diminished. In this late 20th century society, we are faced with some of the same problems that they faced. Our task, however, should be easier because of the advancement in education, jobs and social change.

The mission of the church has not changed in that souls still need to be saved. The church has to be the catalyst for change. It must reach out to save dying men and women from sin and turn them to Jesus. We need to continue the spread of the gospel. We must encourage those outside of Christ to seek the first kingdom of God and His righteousness. We have to be the eyes and ears of the community. We must reach out to families, children, young people and the elderly and proclaim a message of hope. We cannot abandon anyone.

Furthermore, we must lay aside all things that would divide us and become united in Christ, guided by the scriptures and led by the Holy Spirit. We must be submitted and surrendered to the will of God through Jesus Christ.

The founders of this church seemed to have taken their cue from Jeremiah 32:27: Behold, I am the Lord, the God of all flesh. Is there anything too hard for me? With this divine expression of faith, First Baptist must reach for the hand of God, set its sights on higher spiritual things and move deliberately forward into the 21st century. We must believe and know that there is nothing too hard for God.

Let us exercise our faith and fight the good fight of faith. Let us renew our minds in the things of Christ. May God richly bless you, may His face smile on you and His love surround you always.
