Dear General
I have not
had time
to write you
but I have
had time
to write you
and am
now ready
to do so.
We have
left all
our men
in
Hawkins
Tenn
March 30th

enough to take breath & I take this opportunity
let you know my whereabouts.
(On Monday) After the fight we came as far as
Strasburg staid until evening then came up to Wood-
stock staid all night & on Tuesday morning came
to this place where we arrived about night, the
next morning went back towards Woodstock &
staid all night out doors within four miles
of the enemy, the next morning came back to
this place where we have been ever since.

Although we had to retreat, we gave the
enemy rather more than they bargained for
they acknowledge a loss of 2000 killed & wounded
whereas our loss was at the fortess¹ 500
500 in killed wounded & taken prisoners, most
of whom were taken prisoners. The citizens
of Winchester cheered our prisoners (or rather
their prisoners) as they went through the town
They also buried our dead taking a descrip-
tion of each one & marking his grave & they
say our dead amounted to 80 while the
graves of the Yankees covered the ground thick.

We have heard from Col Morris
& Gen Sybe they have been sent on to
Baltimore together with the rest,

The object of Gen Jackson's attack
was to keep the enemy engaged here so as
to keep them from reinforcing me or myself on
the Potowmac, I would not be surprised if
we would cross over the mountain & reinforce
Gen Johnston at any time, something of great
importance is certainly going on, what I can
not tell. There is a daily line of couriers

most about a month ago up he letter which
Dodge gave Ruff brought. excuse blots & bad
writing yet I will send his by John Mayes
between Gen Johnston & Gen Jackson.

Gen Johnston has cut his or my off com-
pletely from the world, he does not even
allow soldiers returning to camp to enter his
lines & no one goes out, some citizens who re-
turn down to see their friends can not get home
what is going on no one can tell but time
will clear it up so this is no use in con-
jecturing. I saw Cousin John to
day (or rather May) Morley of the 8th Va Regt
he was very well, but greatly concerned
about the health of his men as they had
to sleep out in the rain last night.
he will soon get over that though, they have
mustered them in for the war, exactly
what should have been done six months
ago, but I am opposed to filling up the com-
panies with them as we will have to
take about fifty or more.

Our men who have been home have
most all returned & the company looks rather
better than it did a day or so after the fight
I have taken Watson's baggage & will send
it home as soon as possible, except his blankets
which I will take ~~cottage~~ of as I have only two.

Sedgemoor Muffet came down yesterday
to join the artillery, I have been trying to get
him to join our company but he says too
many are killed & taken to suit him.

~~XX~~ Cap White saw Gen Jackson
before he left about our company, the
Gen said he was very sorry we had
lost so many men & said he would favor
the company I wish he would hurry up
& give us horses as I am tired of this
