Camp Stonewall
Sep 1st 1863

Dear Sister

I received your letter of
the 27th & also one from Editor
& Tanner Waller (one which
was enclosed one from Sally)
on yesterday. So if you had
given me space, which you
occupied in copying Sallie's
letter, to other matter I would
have much preferred it.

We are still in our old
Camp & likely to remain so
for some time as all eyes
seem to be fixed upon
events transpiring around
Charleston & Chattanooga.
Our army is now in fine
condition & engaging their
rivals as much as soldiers can.

Gen Ervell reviewed our
Brigade on yesterday, we had
quite a number of brave &
Musical beauties to grace
the field, after the review
we were requested to give
them a Rebel Charge, we
formed in line about 200
yds in front & down the hill
from them & charged up to
ourselves ^{with a yell} the crowd of ladies
officers & negroes (The only
privileged persons in the
army) but who has ever
witnessed a charge of the
Stone wall Brigade & as
we came on such a getting
over the fence you never
saw, the ladies to it will
stand their ground firmly
never flinching & I think
they wished the gallants

of the N brigade to capture them
As for my part I had an
splendid piece in view
but the men such a shore
er of smiles &c &c as com-
pelled me to retire.

After the charge the Gen's
& Col's went off to a supper
whilst we returned to camp
to our beef & bread as well
satisfied as they.

To day the soldiers determined
to have a sham review, so they
appointed their Gen's & Col's from
the neatest men in the brigade.
Of course I would not come in
under that score fixed them
up in Shanghai trimmings pro-
vided themselves with mules &
such specimens of the horse
flesh as you can last winter
& altogether it was quite a complete
